President's Report for 2002

This year has again been a busy one for all of us. As president I attended a 6 week course on Aid and Development in a small village outside of Geneva, The information Switzerland. gained has helped with the preparation of documents for accreditation, and will assist greatly in planning monitoring our projects in the future.

I wish to thank all of you for your personal and financial support of the field workers and their various projects, for without your help they may not be able to continue.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all the faithful assistants who, in 2002, have again helped in so many In particular sincere thanks to those involved with the production and distribution of the newsletters.

China

In March 2002 we had the privilege of visiting the office and staff of HADA Yunnan. It was a delight to again see these committed people and hear first hand of life changing successes with the micro enterprise, child sponsorship and other programs and to listen to them share about some areas of disappointments.

Kazakstan

The Pregnancy Crisis Centre is currently looking for a home or finances to purchase a property.

The Government is asking the team to lecture on health issues as smoking, alcohol. relationships and sexual health. The latter lessons are based on abstinence teaching and have been well received by schools and tertiary institutions where they have been given.

Associated Organisations

This year we have again been able to assist other like minded organisations. A recent addition includes International Assistance Mission in Afghanistan. have been working for many years within the country and are asking for more personnel. We were able to help with this need. Finances

The amount of AUS \$106,574 was raised by the various arms of HADA this last financial year. Of this amount \$58,477 was raised independently of our Australian office and sent directly to the bank accounts within the countries concerned and used for their respective projects. We have not been able to include these figures in our audited statement because of difficulty in verifying the figures against differing overseas accounting standards.

The HADA audited financial statement shows funds raised in Australia. We are very grateful for all the hard work put in by

our supporters and for the funds that we have been able to send to the projects.

Tax Deductibility

Currently the documentation for Tax Deductability is almost complete and is being checked by the HADA Board before the final presentation to the authorities. This has been a major commitment and, unfortunately, has had to wait its turn many times as other matters press in. We expect it to be finalised in March or April.

Membership

I would like to thank all of you who have assisted us by renewing your membership or becoming new members in 2002. We currently have 109. Your membership confirms to the authorities that we have a broad community base of people who support helping those in developing countries.

Board

I would like to thank personally each member of the Board for their assistance and participation in the past year. They have been faithful stewards. At this coming AGM we are hopeful of announcing some new board members whose expertise will be greatly appreciated.

Future

We look forward with great expectation to the opportunities for HADA to assist in developing countries, where we can help to alleviate the hardships of the local sidelined minorities.



HADA Astana 2003

The New Year has begun and with it the continuance of our work in Astana. Winter is cold here. Astana competes with Ulan Bataar in Mongolia for being the coldest capital city in the world. It is a long way from any ocean, which means that the temperatures can swing up, or down at any time. Winter days can be warm, at just below zero or very cold to minus 45°C.

In December we registered a local Non-Government Organisation known as "Source of Hope". By establishing Source of Hope we have done two things. Firstly, we have made the work more local. The six local women we trained as counsellors run Source of Hope, while supported by HADA. It means that HADA can act as an adviser rather than dominating the project as a foreign organisation. Secondly, Source of Hope gives a local face to the project, which will help to build trust with the people in the city.

We have begun the crisis pregnancy work slowly. There is a place where women can ring and come for counselling. Now we need to see the work grow, which means more advertising. We still do not have premises of our own which would make a big difference in the level of service we can provide.



Why a crisis pregnancy centre? Kazakstan has a population of about 15 million people. In the 1990s there were over 2 million abortions. For every birth (live or dead) there are approximately two abortions. Each year about 150,000 women choose to have abortions (official statistics - unofficially the figure may be double). That means that on average about two thirds of women will have abortions during their lifetime. A number of times we have heard of women having over twenty abortions - hard to believe until one understands that for some it is a form of

"contraception" rather than the dealing with a crisis. On one day at the beginning of December a man heard a baby crying in the cold (below 30°C) and brought the abandoned child to the local maternity hospital. Recently in the dormitory building of a Tertiary Institution a dead foetus was found in the rubbish. Putting the story together one can assume that some medical students operated on a girl unable to pay the cost for an abortion of about AUS \$40. Of course this is illegal, but then we hear that this is not uncommon.

As far as we know the centre is the only one of its kind in Kazakstan. Apart from helping girls with crisis pregnancies, it aims to provide counselling services for rape victims and victims of sexual abuse. Women suffering from the psychological effects of an abortion can come to work through their issues.

Apart from the centre, HADA has been teaching health lessons on smoking, alcohol, relationships and sexual health. The latter lessons are based on abstinence teaching and have been well received by the schools and tertiary institutions where they have been given.

We are about to receive a container of humanitarian aid from Crossroads International in Hong Kong. This will provide clothing for pregnant women and children as well as much of what we need to furnish our centre. At the same time we will be helping many other local people in need, such as pensioners, prisoners, disadvantaged children, single mothers and families.

We want to give a special thanks to Crossroads International for the goods and M and M shipping who have organised the transport.

2003 will be a time of growth for our present project and we expect it will be the beginning of some more work. Many thanks to those who have supported the work. Blessings for the New Year!

Believe it or not!

Their average per capita annual income is approximately 600 RMB (AUS \$146). They live a very simple lifestyle up in the mountains. Their limited land can only produce subsistence crops, mainly rice and corn.

They are the YI minority people who live in the County of Yuxi. It is located on the south of Yunnan's capital city of Kunming; about two hours ride away.

Out of these poor families, HADA Yunnan, China is currently supporting fifteen students for their book fees (or school fees) for the period of three years.

We have visited a number of the parents of the sponsored students. In February 2003 we will be making another trip to Yuxi for the purpose of

disbursing loans amounting to 10,000 RMB (AUS \$2,450), to designated families. These micro credit loans of between 500 to 800 RMB (AUS \$125 – \$200) per family will be used for poultry breeding (either chickens or ducks).

We trust that these loans will help the families to generate a more stable income. The man and his daughter pictured here, will receive an 800 RMB (AUS \$200) loan to breed ducks, and in a years time bring in an annual income of up to 2,000 RMB (AUS \$134).



As for the other Yi family pictured below, the husband has gone insane, leaving behind his wife and two children, one of whom is HADA sponsored. Her mountain area is only good for chicken

breeding and 500 RMB (AUS \$125) will be loaned to her for a year. The aim of these micro credit loans is that these families will be able

to fully support their own children's schooling, thus ensuring a brighter future for the next generation.
