Rohingya Micro Business Start-Up Fund

BANGLADESH

Operation Abba is making a difference to thousands of Rohingya refugees from Myanmar who have fled to Bangladesh to seek refuge from the Burmese Military.

rovidentially, I met 'Rashid' and 'Abida' in March 2020, in Cox's Bazaar, Bangladesh. Initially I had planned to visit some of the refugee camps with my host, but we were not allowed in. 'Rashid' and 'Abida' have big hearts to help the Rohingya who fled en masse from Myanmar in 2017. Many of these people have burn scars on their bodies from when their houses were burnt down in their previous homeland, and then there are the unseen scars, or trauma of the soul.

Over one million Rohingya live in the refugee camps served by NGOs. However, 80,000 — 90,000 of them, fearful of what registering as a refugee with the government might mean, decided not to register, and try to survive without government assistance.

It is this group, which is mostly women, including many widows, that we are assisting to help start their own micro business. So far, we have seen a heavily burnscarred 19-year-old start a buy-



and-sell vegetable business, as well as a widow who used to be a beggar and is now feeding beggars! Both businesses received a one-off \$240 start-up assist and are doing well.

also included all necessary auxiliary paraphernalia for clothing design as well as a generous supply of cloth. Some women were already skilled in using the Singer pedal sewing machine and goes towards fundraising for other Rohingya to have the same opportunity. However, as of April, we have also started a micro loan system for new recipients, in which the loan is to be paid back voluntarily within a reasonable time frame. This

assistance is bringing the Rohingy a joy, dignity and the ability to feed themselves and others.

Selling Tea

Another man, (centre photo), who lost his wife and children when his house was burnt down, is succeeding in his mobile tea service. He

carries a very large thermos to provide his clients with tea. This also incurred a oneoff \$240 outlay for Abba.

We would also like to help other Rohingya with a juicing business estimated to cost \$400.

Sewing Garments

Seventeen women have been given sewing machines. The \$320 one-off start-up are doing well. Others are progressing in their skills. One woman struggled to develop her skills, but with the patient coaching of another lady, now has a successful outlet to a retail clothing shop.

Victory School of Hope

VANUATU

ocated in Blacksands, just outside the municipality of Port Vila is an informal peri-urban community. This is where Victory School of Hope serves a very needy community. Many people have been displaced by multiple natural disasters, a large number being from Tanna Island, south of Vanuatu.



In 2012, Victory Church, Port Vila, opened a school in Blacksands to address the need for education in the community. Previously, the school ran classes up to Grade 5, but the facilities were very basic, and the high temperatures and large rainfall in Vanuatu presented barriers to learning. The structures were highly vulnerable to cyclones and storms and Vanuatu is known as one of the world's high-risk nations for natural disasters (according to the World Risk Report 2015).

Working with the local community, our goal has been to provide facilities for children to access education, giving them the opportunity to climb out of the poverty cycle. The school currently runs classes up to Grade 5 and needs new classrooms to offer up to Grade 12. Our aim is to build 14 new classrooms and one administration room at a rate of approximately two rooms per year until completion.

We are very pleased to have partnered with local leaders to develop the Victory School of Hope, using our architecture skills to masterplan the school and design the new classrooms.

Currently, the school has 190 students (80-100 families) across six year levels (kindergarten to Grade 5). Each new classroom and grade offered will provide the opportunity for growth by approximately 30 more students. With the completion of the project, it would help approximately 400 students directly, 150-200 families and their whole community as a flow-on effect. Educating one child can lift the whole future of their family line out of poverty, so the real benefit of this help will likely spread further than can be quantified.

With the first five classrooms now complete and open to students, several S. Group team members travelled to Vanuatu in 2018 to attend the opening ceremony, and to see first hand the impact that this project is already having on the community.

Medical Training in Africa and Asia

he Medical Training in Africa and Asia (AFR-500) team has had a relatively quiet two years due to travel restrictions caused by the Covid pandemic. We are however still providing

financial assistance to support patients under the care of Dr Marvin (urologist at Mbrara, Uganda). Dr Marvin was attending our fistula camps at Kagando Hospital, learning the management of pelvic floor fistulas.

AFR-500 has also provided financial assistance to build an oxygen plant at a government hospital in Madurai, Tamilnadu, India for the treatment of patients with Covid-19 infections. This hospital is the largest public hospital in Madurai and serves

the poor.

As Australia has reopened to international travel and quarantine restrictions ease for the vaccinated, the AFR-500 team is planning to resume volunteer medical assistance in the coming months. The team is planning to

return to Uganda, with invitations to return to DR Congo and other parts of Africa and Asia.

Recently, we have been grateful to receive diathermy machines (used for surgeries) from Medtronic Australasia Pty Ltd. Due to

> hardware upgrades of the current fleet of diathermy machines in Australia, Ms Janine Waddell and Mr Paul Owen (Territory Managers at Medtronic) were able to secure these decommissioned units for charity.

AFR-500 would like to thank Janine and Paul for their hard work in acquiring these units and for ensuring that they were serviced and in good working order. Diathermy machines are important equipment that we regularly use during surgeries here in Australia but due to

accessibility and cost constraints, they are uncommon commodities in resource limited hospitals. These machines are very much welcomed.
