

# HELP THE HOMELESS P4K (Paradise for Kids) MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA

hat is homelessness? What I had in mind was a shallow understanding of what it means to live this way: to be without a permanent address, a life without love but only a constant battle for survival.

When the opportunity came to care for this community by serving a hot meal once a week, we didn't think twice. Our aim was that we wanted to offer a hot meal just like we would serve our family, with the same love and care to the homeless and those at risk of homelessness.

We serve this home-cooked meal without judgment or questions, but ask for suggestions of what they would like us to cook. "Mum's beef stew"



was one of the requests.

A new volunteer recently commented "they really love us!" And we love them too. In the middle of the Covid crisis, a small group of like minded Christians heard of a food van for sale suitable for serving hot food. They found the funds required through P4K.

After looking for the area of greatest need, St Albans in Brimbank was selected, as "Brimbank has the highest incidence of homelessness in

Melbourne's west, and the largest number

of people accessing specialist homelessness services in Victoria" (Brimbank City Council).

Amazingly, our submission for a permit was approved by Council in less than 48 hours. And Council advised us to use the area where most other charitable services are provided.

At 7pm on the 25 July 2021 our first service began in the car park across from the St Albans Station. About 20 people turned up on that day and the numbers slowly increased. Now, looking back, as we approach our second anniversary, even apart from numbers, there has been huge growth and changes.



Service was moved forward to 6.15pm because of the cold and darkness of winter. The recent rise of inflation has seen a rapid increase in the number of families. A cup of hot soup in the colder months, or a bottle of cold water on hot nights, was added. Bread is now distributed, but clothes, shoes, blankets, hygiene products and

useful donated items are distrib-uted when available.

A very welcome change is the start of local businesses now providing help. This includes meat and vegetables from the local IGA store and delicious buns from a local bakery.

We are all volunteers. Our greatest need is financial sponsorship to keep going due to the rapid increase in people needing help. Increasing costs are currently being met by the volunteers — but we do need help.


# REACHING VULNERABLE CHILDREN AND YOUNG ADULTS

SOUTH AFRICA

A glimpse into the world and work of My Father's House *M* y Father's House was established by an Australian as a vehicle through which to reach vulnerable children and young adults in socalled "coloured" (mixed race) communities in the town of Worcester, South Africa. Many are born into a reality of drugs and alcohol, disintegrated families, domestic violence, teenage pregnancies, gangsterism and the rest. Often, as I enter into their world, the psalmist's cry comes to mind: "A Father to the fatherless and a defender of widows – this is God in His holy dwelling" (Psalm 68:5).

In this tension between the consuming reality of a fallen world and the potential that yet exists for reconciliation and restoration, we find our purpose and labour in that "the love of Christ compels us".

We are fighting against a strong, firmly rooted culture of



neglect and abuse, drug dependency, etc. No matter how much we do, it always feels like a drop in the ocean. In faith we believe that the drop will serve as a catalyst and bring about lasting and far-reaching change.

Visits have been made to Roodewal Primary School, at first once a week, then twice a week, to work with a group of ten boys who faced permanent suspension or expulsion from school. One meeting is devoted to Bible study and the other to academic support. Several of the boys have learnt to read for the first time. In the current South African system, they have been pushed through to Grade 6 without meeting the most basic criteria for advancement. The intervention has borne fruit for

seven of the 10 boys who are now back on track. The other three have regrettably been suspended.

The program, "The World Needs a Father" is now being presented at the Toevlug Drug Rehabilitation Centre near Avian Park. This is for adults (19 years of age and older). Recently we covered the first module showing the percentage of harmful crimes and behaviours perpetrated by men who grew up without a father. We proceeded to the overview of childhood development. "In the the home: until the age of six the mother plays the dominant role, but then the focus shifts to the father.

The presentation then continued: "The second phase from about the age of ten or eleven is called the exploratory phase. The child moves out and begins to encounter the wider world. His friends become the focal point as he learns from his exposure to life and all its varied experiences." Then more time to contemplate. "What happens if the child enters this exploratory phase without the grounding he needed from the father?" More contemplation.

"Any questions?" is asked.

A hand goes up: "Is there any way to make up for what I missed before the age of eleven?" A second hand: "My son is going on to eleven. Is it too late for me to start giving him what I have neglected up to now?"



The father delineates right and wrong, imposes a loving discipline, exhibits healthy authority and respect for rules and boundaries, offers an example of responsible and wholesome living." A pause here is made for the men to reflect on the implications, which happened – as usual – in a time of stark, yet uncomfortable silence.

From here we moved on to an enthusiastic discussion of grace, reconciliation, restoration and redemption. One of the men asked for a Bible.

# BANGLADESH PROJECT LEADER VISITS AUSTRALIA

K alyan, who oversees five HADA projects in Bangladesh, visited Australia to update and

thank the organisations that support the vital work. Kalyan met with members of the HADA board and outlined the enormous impact that the work is having in people's lives through adult education and the schools' program. It was an evening of great fellowship. His report on the boys in the orphanage was very encouraging as they develop into fine young men. Two boys did the School Certificate



(S.C.) last year and achieved Grade Point Averages of 4.71 and 4.87 out of a possible 5.0. Five boys will be sitting the S.C. this year.

Kalyan visited several schools and was able to share with the students what life in Bangladeshi schools is like and the challenges that face many of the families. Kalyan detailed the significant benefits many communities have received through the provision of highquality education that has been made possible through the generosity of many people in Australia. The question-andanswer sessions with the students were a highlight.



In the aftermath of the earthquake in Turkey and Syria, **First Hope Association** responded promptly, assisted by contributions through HADA which amounted to \$64,000. Some of what was accomplished:

- Support for the search and rescue efforts
- Establishment of 7000 shelters
- Play tents were set up for children with tables, chairs, toys, books, clothes, cots, mattresses, shoes
